Echo questions

Introduction

"I asked Joyce to marry me." "You asked her to marry you?!"

Definition

These are responses, in the form of questions, to being asked or told something.

Introduction

There are two main forms:

Repetition	Subject + verb + question word
A: "I just heard that Sam got the manager's job." B: "He got the <i>manager's</i> job?"	A: "Carol's gone to Paris to see a client." B: "She's gone <i>where</i> ?" [alternative to "Where has she gone?"]

To show surprise, shock or disbelief	"Did you know it's raining?" "It's <i>raining</i> ?! Not again!"
	"Your visitors will be here in 10 minutes." "They'll be here <i>when</i> ?! But I'm not
Note that we stress the question word and often a key word when	ready yet."
repeating a phrase.	"Did you know Simon's back from his trip?"
	" <mark>He's <i>back</i>? I thought he was going for longer."</mark>
	"Jamie went skiing and broke an arm and a leg."
	"He broke an arm <i>and</i> a leg?!"

Examples



"I saw Hannah and she's getting married next week." "Anna's getting married?" "No, not Anna - Hannah!"



"I gave the file to Keith." "You gave it to who?"



"They've already got four children and now they're expecting twins."

"Twins?!"



"We visited a remote village in the desert to see an ancient monument. The only way to get there was on camels.""You got there *how*?!"
