"I asked Joyce to marry me." "You asked her to *marry you*?!"

Definition

These are responses, in the form of questions, to being asked or told something.

Introduction

There are two main forms:

Repetition	Subject + verb + question word
<p>A: "I just heard that Sam got the manager's job."</p> <p>B: "He got the <i>manager's job</i>?"</p>	<p>A: "Carol's gone to Paris to see a client."</p> <p>B: "She's gone <i>where</i>?" [alternative to "Where has she gone?"]</p>

Uses

Use	Examples
-----	----------

To show surprise, shock or disbelief

"Did you know it's raining?"
"**It's raining**?! Not again!"

Note that we stress the question word and often a key word when repeating a phrase.

"Your visitors will be here in 10 minutes."
"**They'll be here when**?! But I'm not ready yet."

"Did you know Simon's back from his trip?"
"**He's back**? I thought he was going for longer."

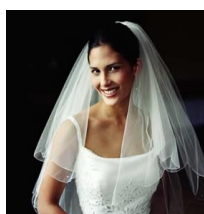
"Jamie went skiing and broke an arm and a leg."
"**He broke an arm and a leg**?!"

To ask for confirmation if we didn't hear or understand something

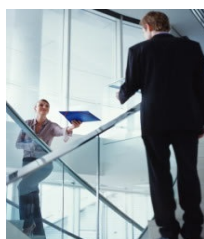
"This is Nicky's pen. Can you give it back to her?"
"**It's whose**?"

"Myles has finished the report. It's taken ages."
"**He's finished it**?"

Examples



"I saw Hannah and she's getting married next week." "**Anna's getting married**?" "No, not Anna - Hannah!"



"I gave the file to Keith." "**You gave it to who**?"



"They've already got four children and now they're expecting twins."

"**Twins?!**"



"We visited a remote village in the desert to see an ancient monument. The only way to get there was on camels." "You got there **how?!**"
