## Auxiliary verb: 'do'



Do you want sugar in your coffee?

We can use the verb 'do' alone: I do my e-learning.

Or as an auxiliary with a main verb to form questions and negatives:

Do you <u>do</u> your elearning at weekends? I don't <u>do</u> my elearning at weekends.

The auxiliary verb does not have a specific meaning but is necessary to form these structures.

## **Examples**



He doesn't feel well.



Does this train go to London?



Do you like steak? Yes, I don't like pork.
